Of central importance are the cultural encounters with Dutch students, as well as the exchange of current concepts and methods of Inclusive Education and Social Work from the two countries. The course begins with information on fundamental principles of Social Work and on competent pedagogical support and assistance for people with disabilities in Germany and The Netherlands. Inter-professional exchange is in focus, as well. This semester the Dutch students and their teachers will visit us in Freiburg.</i></p>	2	3

Schirilla, Nau-sikaa	<p>1.2.3 Professional orientation in Social work</p> <p><i>In this course we will discuss the ethics and the self-understanding of social work as a profession. We will make many visits to the field in order to come to know the variety of the fields of social work and to reflect our definition of social work and professional identities. The course will be bilingual in German and English.</i></p>	3	3

Lenger, Alexander	<p>2.3.2 Seminar: Obedience to Authority: The Milgram Experiment</p> <p>The so called Milgram experiment on obedience to authority is considered among the most important psychological studies of the 20th century. Between 1961 and 1965, Milgram carried out a series of experiments to research to what extent people would obey orders even when they knew them to be highly questionable. The experiments have been widely criticized for ethical reasons first and became one of the most famous social experiments for explaining obedient behavior later. Perhaps because of the enduring significance of the findings-the surprising ease with which ordinary persons can be commanded to act destructively against an innocent individual by a legitimate authority-it continues to claim attention and helps us to understand and explain deviant behavior.</p> <p>In the seminar, we will first read and discuss the 1974 original book of social psychologist Stanley Milgram "Obedience to Authority: An Experimental View". The book provides an in-depth look into the experiment conducted and his methods, theories and conclusions. After an insightful discussion we will discuss if these findings are still relevant today and what we can learn from them for contemporary social work.</p> <p>Reading Milgram, Stanley (1974): Obedience to Authority. 	This seminar is directed to all incoming students. It will give an overview of the German welfare system. Students will learn how the social and the health system are organized and what kind of support disadvantaged groups can claim. In addition visits to the fields will be organized to institutions or organizations in the field of social work, inclusive education or health. The visits will be chosen according to interests and wishes of the students.		
Ajagbe, Samsondeen	Social and educational work with migrants <i>Since 2015, Freiburg experienced an enormous influx of refugees from different countries. Many of the refugees are quite young and are attending schools and vocational training. This seminar seeks to focus on the social aspects of the refugee population and education as a tool to ensure integration. Which social aspects seem to be problematic in the German society? In which way can education be regarded as a bridge to integrate young refugees? These are some of the questions that will be given attention to in this substantial seminar. Through explorative / research-based learning in groups, students develop the thematic field step by step.</i>	2	3
